Hello All. I would like to highlight some offerings that are going on in the Diocese, in the community, and in our parish. Hope that this list inspires us!

- 1. Covenant Group Update and Invitation: The newly formed Covenant group has begun meeting regularly at St. Paul's on the first and third Tuesdays of the month from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. On the first Wednesday of the month, the current Ministry Support Team joins in the formation. The group has decided to study Church History as our first module and has chosen a book by Karen Armstrong as the first book to read portions of. Chet DeFonso is going to choose selections to read. If anyone in the congregation is interested in joining in the Covenant group formation, they are welcome to do so.
- Aging Expert to come talk on Spirituality and Aging September 23. My good friend and colleague Dorothy Linthicum, former professor of Formation at Virginia Theological Seminary, will be in Marquette from September 20<sup>th</sup> to the 25<sup>th</sup>. St. Paul's is hosting her visit. She will, among other things, be leading a morning workshop on Spirituality and Aging: Seven Practices to keep us close to God.

The Outreach Committee met on Thursday, June 15th. Here's what we discussed:

- ➤ Camp New Day 24 fleece-tied blankets have been made for the campers! Thanks to Carol and Bob Potrzuski for organizing this and to all who donated money to purchase the fleece and those who donated their scissor-cutting and tying skills to make these blankets. They are truly a favorite of the campers. BTW Camp this year will be Monday, July 17 through Saturday, July 22. Volunteers are needed to drive campers to and from camp. See Carol and/or Bob if you are interested and available.
- Community Meal we were happy to have Cathy and Fred Cole in on this discussion. Community meal seems to be running smoothly and is much appreciated by our neighbors at Pine Ridge and Snowberry Heights. The number of guests has increased since we resumed CM in November there were 35 guests and St. Paul's members at the May meal! We decided that the "coordinator" position will be shared on a rotational basis by Outreach committee members. Coordinators will ensure that there are at least 2 hosts from 2 different households for each monthly meal. Those hosts will set the "main dish" menu and all are invited to help fill in with the "sides." Hosts are also responsible for set-up and clean-up and a detailed list of what that involves is available on the Outreach information table and also posted on the kitchen refrigerator. We find that CM guests are very helpful when it comes to clean-up! Thanks to all who contribute to Community meal it not only provides food, it provides community and socializing. - ➤ Habitat for Humanity we will again be providing 3 lunches for volunteer builders. The dates are **August 14**, **August 21** and **August 28**. Jacquey Shellenbarger is coordinating this. - ➤ *Team Brownsville* Sue Micensky reported that 100-150 people are welcomed and served by TB volunteers.
- ➤ Feeding America West MI the Diocese and ecumenical partners are launching a fundraising campaign this summer. The goal is \$100,000 and a matching grant of \$10,000 has already been established. No donation is too small the latest impact report from FAWM indicates that \$1 = 30 nourishing meals. ALL donations received in this summer campaign go to food pantries and mobile distributions in the U.P.

Mobile distribution dates: July 5<sup>th</sup> - Munising, July 12<sup>th</sup> - Sawyer Village, and July 19<sup>th</sup> - Marquette. August 2<sup>nd</sup> - Munising, August 9<sup>th</sup> Sawyer Village, and August 16<sup>th</sup> - Marquette. If you know of someone who would benefit from a food distribution but does not have transportation to the sites, it is ok for you to pick up a distribution for them. (You will be asked to provide name, address, and demographic information for data purposes.)

# Season of Creation

Seasonal Planners have decided to celebrate BOTH the Season of Creation AND the Women's Lectionary during the period **August 20** through **October 2**. All readings except the Epistle will be from the Women's Lectionary. Readings in the Epistle slot will be from the writings of Hildegard of Bingen, (well known for her work on environmental subjects) chosen for their relation to the Creation theme of the week. Liturgical texts (Prayers of the People and Eucharistic Prayer) for this period will be from recent Seasons of Creation. Preachers will have the option of using Creation theme of the week or Women's Lectionary theme. Note that, beginning this quarter, newly-discerned preachers are being given the opportunity to "practice preaching" up to once/quarter.

The usual Fall Quarter schedule (October through December) will be posted from **August 13** through **September 10** for folks to sign up for specific roles on specific dates or to tell me when not to schedule you. # Pilgrimage to the Abbey on Iona, Scotland Combined Campus Ministry NMU

From May 27<sup>th</sup> until June 2<sup>nd</sup>, a group of six mentors and seven NMU campus ministry participants lived in the Iona Abbey and participated fully in the life of the community. The mentors were three campus ministry pastors, a member of the Lutheran Synod staff, a volunteer from a supporting congregation, and a parent. The idea for this trip grew from a recognition by Bre Kinnunen, Lutheran Campus Minister, that international study and immersion in community was formative in her life and, she felt, would be pivotal in the lives of twenty-somethings as they launched into adulthood. Indeed this assumption was validated when, at the end of our week on Iona one of the staff members took us aside and said this: "The ripple effect of having brought these young adults here is going to be huge. You have all done such a good thing getting them here."

The Iona community describes itself as "an international ecumenical Christian Movement working for justice and peace, the rebuilding of community and the renewal of worship." Indeed this was our experience. From the first moment of being greeted at the jetty and brought to the Abbey for tea, biscuits, and orientation to the last moment of a commitment service and being waved off from the jetty by the entire Abbey staff, we were immersed in a process of active listening, encouragement to participation and relationship, welcoming worship, and challenging embodied spirituality. We ate food that resonated with earth-friendly practices. We cleaned bathrooms, toasted bread, assisted in worship, mopped floors, set tables for meals. We talked with strangers who became friends, and we participated in programming that connected us to God, to each other, to the land, and to the work of peace and justice.

You have to want to get to Iona to journey there. The physical journey from the UP is a two day one at least: from here to Scotland and then across Scotland by train to the island of Mull, then a ferry to Mull, a bus ride across Mull to the final connecting ferry that delivers one to Iona and the Abbey. Yet the effort to get to Iona began months ahead of time with logistics hammered out, a budget created, multiple fundraisers executed, individuals raising their own support, outfitting ourselves with passports, hiking boots, rain gear, and prayers. We studied Celtic Christianity and began to get comfortable with not really knowing what was ahead.

The results of the pilgrimage, who we will become, what we will do, as a result of our time there are yet to be seen, but the effort of going away to live in community has already shown promise. One of the participants, on the last night of our stay at the Abbey, during an open-mic celebration, shared a poem that they had written about their time on Iona:

# Breath of the Isle by Freddie Neufeld

Can you see it?

The green-covered hills as the craggy stones peek out, inviting you, asking you to climb, to greet the morning sky.

The pink stones of mull, shining in the evening sun.

And the church walls of granite, lending refuge to the people within.

Let me look into your face and know you and see the reflection of love in your eyes.

Can you hear it?

The warbling calls of sparrows and skylarks

merging with notes of singing as pilgrims chant the melodies of the land's memories.

The stones breathe on this island.

The lambs cry out, the oyster catchers shriek, and the jackdaws call.

Sitting in the hermit's ring of stones, I realized that it was not the stones

but a reflection of my own slow, deep breath.

A breath that steadies in contemplative silence or quakes when calling out injustices.

A breath that propels a voice.

# Can you feel it?

The rumble in your core before a belly laugh, as we turn a solemn bible reading into louder-thanlife dramatics.

The smile spreading slowly as strangers being vulnerable turn to steadfast friends. And a sigh in awe escaping your lips as tiny puffins fly.

There is magic in these hills, among the buttercups and daisies.

This beautiful place has changed us, and now we can cycle that change forward. But we already knew that. We just had to relearn it.

Can you see it? Can you hear it? Can you feel it? Our souls are beginning to sing.

St. Paul's will be providing lunch to Habitat for Humanity workers/volunteers three consecutive Monday's in August. In the past we have provided a lunch once each month in the summer but by having it three weeks in a row (August 14, 21, and 28) on Mondays, would allow parishioners to drop off their food contribution into the church kitchen refrigerator or simply on the counter the day before and it will be delivered. If that's not possible, food can be dropped off at the Habitat house on M28 in Harvey before 11:30 a.m. the day of the meal. To contribute, there are three lists posted on the billboard, one for each week's meal. There will be BBQ shredded meat and hamburger buns provided for each meal. A uniform menu will be used for each meal: two to three salads, brownies, a fruit tray and a veggie tray. When signing up, please include your telephone number. # Team Brownsville-August Charity by Sue Micensky

In the summer of 2018, a couple of friends began helping asylum seekers when they crossed the border into Brownsville, Texas. They provided food, water, and blankets for bus rides as people traveled to join their sponsors. Then these friends started bringing food and water to a handful of people sleeping on the sidewalk at the base of the International Bridge in Matamoros, Mexico (the port of entry into the U.S.). As more and more people were prohibited from entering the United States, a refugee encampment developed in Mexico along the banks of the Rio Grande River. These friends started recruiting others to help.

Frank and I joined them in the winter of 2019. We fixed meals in our kitchen, gathered at the bus station in Brownsville, and pulled wagons of food and supplies into Matamoros. We weren't very organized in those days and sometimes brought big pans of beans and rice but forgot serving spoons! We watched the number of asylum seekers grow from 30 to 50 to 100 to 150. Everyone was looking across the river and waiting for a chance to enter the U.S. and request asylum.

When the number of meals increased to 1,700/day, Team Brownsville partnered with World Central Kitchen. Then we prepared food in a large truck and a church kitchen. We loaded salads, entrees, fresh fruit, and bottled water into wagons and pulled them into Mexico. In partnership with the asylum seekers, we operated a school, a library, and four free stores in the encampment.



Currently our main program is a Welcome Center in Brownsville where we greet asylum seekers, provide them with a simple meal, food, water, and activities for their journeys to wherever their sponsors are. Because of changes in Mexico, we can no longer provide daily meals, but we bring non-perishable food into the encampments whenever we can.

Team Brownsville is a not-for-profit corporation. All of our work is powered by volunteers and funded by donations. The community at St. Paul's has provided financial support and supplies. In August, you can help Team Brownsville by donating money, fleece jackets, or small stuffed animals.

# Welcomers by Arlene Gordanier
