St Paul's - A Community of Ministers, Celebrating the 3rd Generation Covenant Group

In the May Messenger, Kris Mowafy shared the journey and the mission of the Discernment group. The discernment group invites those identified to covenant for education, and those requirements necessary for ordination and or commissioning. This invitation is an awesome gift to grow in our relationship with our baptismal promises: for our lives, and our communities, and to support all the ministries at St Paul's.

This 3rd generation Covenant Group gathered with Marna Franson, our missioner, our consultant and most definitely our guide and partner.

On May 7th, we spent time sharing the excitement and awesome gift this covenant group is and will be. The group also began to talk about a covenant - the promises we make as we shape this experience. Those who are ordained and commissioned as the Ministry Support Team will also join with the Covenant Group for education, training, and other opportunities.

All members of the congregation are invited to join this Covenant Group as *members-at-large*. The Covenant Group meets twice a month for 2–3-hour sessions. These meetings are shaped by the curriculum and other study resources and opportunities. Discernment and identifying gifts are a continuing process in this time together. It is anticipated that it will take 18-24 months for the curriculum to be completed. The group has chosen the 1st and 3rd Tuesdays of the month beginning on **Tuesday, June 6th**, beginning at 5:30.

The discernment process at St. Paul's has resulted in a group of people who will be studying together for two years as they prepare for commissioning or ordination. We are calling this group a Covenant group because we are making a commitment to walk through a process of preparation so that we can serve to support the ministry at St. Paul's. In the next couple of years, we will be exploring various canonically required subjects: Scripture, Church History, Liturgics, Issues in Contemporary Society, Ethics, Practical Theology, Diversity, and Anglican Studies. We will also be studying the art of welcome, the art of preaching, spiritual growth and development, pastoral care, etc. Throughout this process we will be getting to know one another, learning to function in a unified way, and fanning the flames of dedication, interest, and ministry.

The Open Door to the Covenant Group:

If anyone in the congregation feels a stirring to dedicate two years to study and learning and to participate in ongoing discernment about serving the ministry of St. Paul's, please let us know. Contact Marna directly. The door is open to anyone in the congregation who wants to embark on this journey with the Covenant group.

The Schedule for the Covenant Group:

The Covenant Group will meet the first and third Tuesdays of the month from 5:30 pm to 7:30 pm in the Great Room, beginning June 6th. July we will meet on the second and third Tuesdays because of the 4th of July Holiday. If one is a sunbird or a snowbird, know that there will be a ZOOM in option for joining in.

"Praying in" the Covenant Group:

As a beginning point to this study and preparation, the Covenant group wants to start with a liturgical dedication to each other, to this process, and to this congregation. A specific set of prayers and affirmations was said during church on Sunday, May 21st.



The Button Up Project

is a fundraising initiative that benefits homeless children of the Upper Peninsula. The project uses the McKinney-Vento Grant definition of homeless children to mean anyone who does not have a stable and/or safe nighttime residence. The project will be holding a rummage sale at the church on Friday afternoon, **June 9**, and Saturday, **June 10**, 2023.

Most donations are accepted and are being stored in the church basement until the sale. Donation exceptions include mattresses, large exercise equipment, and some TVs and computers that would not be accepted at local thrift stores after the sale. When Frank and I were at the Welcome Center in Brownsville, Texas over the winter we saw about 50-100 asylum seekers/day. However, in the ten days before Title 42 ended, about 700-1,000 asylum seekers came each day. Because they feared what would happen after Title 42 ended, they arrived at the border either at a port of entry or by swimming across the Rio Grande River. They presented themselves to Customs and Border Patrol and requested asylum. They were met by National Guard troops with assault rifles, helicopters, and coils of razor wire. They were processed and usually sent to detention facilities. After being released to the City of Brownsville they were brought to the Team Brownsville Welcome Center. Such large numbers were overwhelming but volunteers were prepared. Some of the asylum seekers stuffed travel bags, made sandwiches, and handed out clothes. They often do this if they aren't leaving right away to join their sponsors.

Among all the tales of hardship there were also some heartwarming stories. One man, Jose, had not been allowed into the country at the same time as his pregnant wife and when he did enter later he was held in a detention facility for several more weeks. After he was released, Team Brownsville worked with Grannies Respond to fly him to Florida where his

wife had just given birth to their daughter. They sent a picture of the baby wearing clothes provided by Team Brownsville.

After Title 42 ended there was no surge of refugees, no "crisis at the border". Only about 80 are coming to the Welcome Center each day. There are still thousands of people living on the street or in makeshift encampments in Matamoros, Mexico. Seeking asylum is a basic human right protected by the United Nations following WWII and by the US Refugee Act of 1980. However, the already complicated process of requesting asylum is now even more severely restricted by new regulations. Guards in Mexico prevent asylum seekers from getting near the bridge unless they have secured an appointment by using the problematic CBP One app. Officials at Mexico's southern border refuse to grant travel permits to people fleeing across Mexico to the US. If refugees cross between ports of entry, if they don't pass a "credible fear" interview, or if they don't meet every one of the asylum criteria, they are deported back to their home countries and can't reapply for five years.

When will we open our hearts and our borders and welcome the stranger?

The Outreach committee met on May 18th. Topics of discussion included:

- > Community Meal: St. Paul's has resumed Community Meal on the *last* Wednesday of the month. Attendance is increasing. *Our concern is that at this point there is no overall coordinator for Community Meal!* The coordinator(s) do not necessarily have to be present at every monthly meal, but he/she/they have to ensure that there are on-site "hosts" for every meal to set up and clean up and that food is provided. Community Meal provides not only food for our neighbors, but community as well. Please answer this call. *Look for sign-up sheets in the parking lot entry or call the church office.* Needed: June, July, August coordinators. - ➤ Habitat for Humanity: this will be our Outreach Ministry of the Month for June. We will be providing three lunches for HH volunteer workers during the summer building season. Jacquey Shellenbarger is working with HH to set dates for three consecutive Mondays. Stay tuned. Other ways to support HH include: financial donations and donating to and shopping at the ReStore, located next to Lafaro's grocery store in Harvey.
- > Team Brownsville: Sue Micensky reported that even though Title 42 has ended, there are still many barriers to entry into the U.S. and asylum seekers who are fleeing from dangerous countries are living in sub-standard conditions at the border. Financial assistance is needed for supplies at the Welcome Center in Brownsville. Also needed are lightweight jackets/sweatshirts for adults, especially men. Team Brownsville will be the Outreach Ministry of the Month in August.

The Outreach Committee meets on the 3rd Thursday of the month at 10:00. The next meeting is **June 15th**. All are welcome!


