Annual Ecumenical CROP Hunger Walk Scheduled for Sunday, **October 1**

Here is our annual way to contribute to the fight against hunger, both locally and internationally.

St. Paul's has contributed to this effort over a great number of years. What has been disappointing is the small number of walking units from St. Paul's in recent years. Please join us as a walking unit — either as individuals, couples, or families. Or at St. Paul's, it could even be as a parish group.

Step 1 is to get a walker's envelope from me. The earlier this is done, the better opportunity you will have to recruit others to contribute on behalf of your walking effort.

Step 2 can be to register on-line as a walker; this makes it easier to request on-line donations from folks who live away from Marquette. Even folks

at St. Paul's may prefer to contribute on-line than via check or cash. I can help you register on-line. A list of St. Paul's walking units will be posted so that all at St. Paul's may contribute on behalf of your walking effort.

If Sunday afternoon, **October 1** is not a convenient time for you to walk, you may do your walk any day or time prior to that. The official walk is from Marquette Hope Connection (Methodist Church at 927 W. Fair), with routes laid out of two and three miles.

As in past years, 25% of all donations are given to local food pantries (split between St. Vincent de Paul and NMU); 75% goes to combat world-wide hunger via CROP, the international food delivery arm of Church World Service. Any checks should be made out to: CWS/CROP. Questions — ask Bob Railey

Caregivers offer a powerful witness to being present to the aging, and those with dementia. Often the Care Givers are Adult Children with aging parents, or an aging spouse, many times a dearly loved friend. The question "How do we support our loved one and how do we care for ourselves? What services are available to keep caregivers grounded in self-care while caring for those we love?" "Staying in my Lane": will have hints and help for being this caregiver.

Friday, September 22 10:00 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. You will not want to miss an opportunity to see what resources are available in Marquette County at this Resource Fair on Friday. The resource fair will be highlighting all things aging including dementia. We will have a light lunch and an opportunity to learn more about dementia from Dorothy Linthicum. This event will be held at Messiah Lutheran Church, 305 West Magnetic, Marquette.

Saturday, September 23 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. at St. Paul's, 201 E Ridge, Marquette. A highly practical workshop by Dorothy Linthicum concerning spirituality and aging, Dorothy will introduce us to seven spiritual practices that speak to older people.

Aging is a gift, and a challenge and life presents us with opportunities for rich experiences as well as challenges. Dorothy Linthicum will share her vision for the future regarding dementia care. She will also engage those present in conversation about how important it is for Caregivers to look for and receive support in this ministry to those we love. Adult Children can find themselves in a deep quagmire with how to offer care and guidance to aging parents as well as honoring our parents.

Dorothy Linthucum is an expert on Spirituality and Aging and co-author of "Redeeming Dementia: Spirituality, Theology, and Science." Dorothy brings personal experience as well as learning and addressing this challenge of Aging. We will have an opportunity at each of these events for questions and conversation and how we continue expanding plans into the community in "Coming Soon" How will we engage with the Resources as tools, Caregivers Corner. Together we have Wisdom to harvest in our stories – they are a comfort and a springboard for this gift and challenge of aging. Using the book *Redeeming Dementia* for study can call us to gather and act in the days to come. It might well help many of us to plan now for how we would most delight in living at this stage of our lives. The planning team is thrilled to have Dorothy Linthicum visit us and to share in these workshops. We are equally excited to have you all join us as we explore aging.

The Outreach committee met on August 17th. Here's what was discussed:

- Community Meal this is going well and we appreciate the support and encouragement from Vestry on this. Community Meal is held the last Wednesday of the month at 6:00. Attendance is at about 35 people each meal. A review of the structure: 1). Every meal has a coordinator to make sure the sign-up sheet is complete and get notices out to church and Pine Ridge. 2). Every meal has 1-2 "hosts" from two different households. Usually, the hosts will provide the main meal and others are welcome to pitch in as well. Other contributions are needed for the "sides." 3.) If you are volunteering to provide food and/or help with set-up and clean-up, please arrive at church about 5:15/5:30. The meal is served at 6:00. Thanks to all who volunteer in this effort. It's more than just feeding people it's providing socialization and building community. It is greatly appreciated by those who attend. And it's fun!!!!
- Camp New Day reports a great season. There were plenty of blankets for the campers thanks a lot!
- Habitat for Humanity In August we provided three lunches for Habitat volunteer builders. This is a great help to HH check out the "thank you" notes on the bulletin board. Thanks to Jacquey Shellenbarger for coordinating this!
- Asylum Seekers. This is a project headed by Messiah Lutheran Church to provide support for a family from Central America now living in Marquette. The mother in the family is employed and now all three of her sons are in Marquette. If you want to become involved, there is a "volunteer form" on the Outreach table. If you wish to provide financial support, it is best to give directly to Messiah Lutheran Church, "Asylum Seekers." Bob Railey is the contact for Asylum Seekers.
- RATI has a new executive director and we welcome Chelsie Wilkenson to that position. A BIG project coming up in 2023/24 is repair to the exterior of their building, currently known as "The Warming Center." RATI continues to meet the needs and challenges of providing for the homeless. St. Paul's has been with them from the very beginning. Stay tuned for how we can continue to provide support.
- Other news: 1) The Women's Center has a new executive officer Jennine Frazier. The Women's Center will continue to be one of our Outreach Ministries. 2) Sarah Zyburt will be the executive director of The Northern Lights Child Advocacy Center. The purpose of this agency is to provide high-quality services to child survivors of physical and sexual abuse, neglect, human trafficking, and witness to violence, through compassionate and high-standard interviewing protocols and follow-up counseling.

Asylum Seekers

Details About Making Financial Contributions to Messiah Lutheran's Asylum Seekers Project: Especially at the start of Russia's invasion of Ukraine, our Episcopal diocese and various of our churches explored the possibility of hosting families from Ukraine and the world's many other sources of refugees. All of our Episcopal groups (including diocesan Peace & Justice) decided that we did not have the resource base necessary to take on such a project.

We at St. Paul's decided that we would devote whatever resources we could to the project that Messiah Lutheran had already been supporting for a couple of years hosting an extended family from Honduras. St. Paul's will continue having the Messiah project receive one month per year of Sunday Outreach contributions. In light of the immense financial need of this project, St. Paul's Outreach Committee is encouraging individual members of St. Paul's to send their contributions directly to Messiah via U.S. mail: Asylum Seekers Project Fund, Messiah Lutheran Church, 305 W. Magnetic St. Make checks payable to Messiah Lutheran Church, with "Asylum Seekers Project" in the memo line. Questions — ask Bob Railey.
