We are reviewing the responses that come in and holding group discussions in the hope of understanding the vision that you have regarding our church. We will be holding these discussions again on Sunday, January 28 following the service, and on Wednesday, January 31 at 4:30 prior to the Community Meal. Your thoughts are important to us.

Stewardship Thoughts

Why pledge?

We spend a lot of time thinking and talking about why we give, less about why we pledge. And disclaimer – this is not the result of some scholarly study or survey, these are simply some of the thoughts going around in my (Charlie's) head. So –

- 1) We pledge so that the church has a rough idea of what financial resources it will have available through the year. Suppose we all gave our yearly offering in the first month. The next 11 would be a pretty big surprise!

 There is debate among stewardship people as to whether we should build the budget and then ask people to pledge to cover it, or ask people to pledge and then build a budget out of that amount, or simply build a budget that reflects what we think God is calling us to be and do in the coming year and trust that the resources will be there. Where would you be most comfortable among those choices?
- 2) pledging helps us be thoughtful and intentional about or giving. What percentage of what we have or receive does it feel right and good to give, and to whom? The Bible talks about giving 10% does that feel right and good for us? There was a story about a gentleman who would put \$5 in the offering plate when he was a visitor in a church, figuring that would about cover "his share" of the work of that congregation for that week. Well, we all know what happens \$5 doesn't buy you a hamburger and fries anymore. Pledging helps us be thoughtful and intentional about how much we give and to whom.
- 3) pledging helps us track how well we are keeping up with out intentions through the year. It's trite (but true) during these weeks to note the New Year's Resolutions left in the dust behind us. When we get to March or June or September, what we have pledged compared to what we have given helps us track how we are doing at living out our intentions.

Certainly circumstances change and giving amounts can end up being more or less than pledged amounts. No big deal! But these are some of the reasons pledging is helpful for the church and for ourselves. (And yes, you can make a pledge to St Paul's Church anytime.
