NFSP Grant Update by Fred Cole

We are very pleased that as we begin 2025 and begin to celebrate the 150th anniversary of our beautiful sanctuary building, the historic preservation grant we received from the National Fund for Sacred Places is taking shape. We look forward to caring for and preserving the building that has housed and nurtured so many people and missions for 150 years, and we are excited that as we pass through St. Paul's we can be good stewards of this place for the people and missions that will grow from here in the next 150 years.

We are very excited that the *M.E Davenport* Foundation* is providing a \$15,000 matching grant to help us with our fundraising efforts. If St. Paul's is able to raise \$15,000, the Davenport Foundation will contribute another \$15,000. This \$30,000 will count toward our \$135,000 match for the NFSP grant. Special thanks to Mary Sullivan for helping St. Paul's secure this wonderful grant!

St. Paul's has joined the Lake Superior Community Partnership to help promote and publicize the grant and our fundraising efforts. We hope that this membership will also help make the larger community more aware of St. Paul's and the many important ministries and events that occur here. This week Ken Czapski of Sanders and Czapski Architects will conduct a complete building assessment to be sure we are seeing all the priorities and needs for the building as we move forward.

More good news--a fundraising committee is forming plans and seeking assistance with raising funds to match the \$135,000 grant the NFSP has provided. Another group of people is working on "telling our story" to help strengthen our presence in the community. Jan Brodersen and Janice Peterson are planning a concert (or concerts!) to help raise funds for the grant match. Other 150th anniversary celebration plans are also beginning to form including a "History Walking Tour" with Jim Koski of O107 radio.

*M.E. Davenport Foundation Matching Grant by Mary Sullivan

The M.E. Davenport Foundation has approved a matching grant of up to \$15,000 to be applied to the \$135,000 needed to match the National Fund for Sacred Places grant. What this means is: when we at St. Paul's have raised \$15,000, the Davenport Foundation will match that amount, bringing the total to \$30,000 and that \$30K can then be applied to the \$135,000 needed for the NFSP grant. A donation of \$25 is now worth \$50, a donation of \$50 is now worth \$100, and on and on, up to \$15K. No donation is insignificant! But it gets even better ...

Technically, the MEDF match grant is on the table until September 30, 2025. However, if we at St. Paul's can raise \$33,750 by **May 1st**, we can receive 50% of the NFSP grant (\$67,500) in the Fall of 2026. If we have made the MEDF match, the additional amount needed by May 1st has now been reduced to \$3,750. So, let's get going on this!

Team Brownsville Update by Sue Micensky

Asylum seekers are no longer allowed to cross the border into the U.S. so Team Brownsville is focusing on helping people in tent shelters in northern Mexico. According to Andrea Rudnik, Team Brownsville President, "People have to come up with a new plan as to how they're going to go on with the rest of their lives, what they're going to do. We've been told that some may move to another city, some may actually apply for asylum in Mexico. There may be others who make different decisions to go to other countries that they feel are safer than their original home country."

In southern Texas, many adults who are not U.S. citizens are completing paperwork to designate guardians for their children in case they are deported. Targeted arrests continue but there are no mass deportations at this time. Border Patrol reports a dramatic decrease in apprehensions of people crossing between ports of entry. The ESL (English as a Second Language) classes at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Port Isabel saw a dramatic decrease in attendance immediately after Inauguration Day but students have been gradually returning. Overall, it's a tense period of waiting to see what happens next.
