## NFSP Grant Update by Fred Cole

In March and April, St. Paul's continued to build momentum in our efforts for the National Fund for Sacred Places grant. We are both honored and humbled to have been one of 24 congregations selected from nearly 500 applicants nationwide for this historic preservation grant.

Jan Brodersen and Janice Peterson organized the "Sounds in Sacred Spaces" concert for Sunday March 30th at 3:00 p.m. It was postponed by a snowstorm to April 13th. Darrius Morton, Kristen and Jimmy Ludwig, Liz Grigio Mahoney, the Kitchel family, Michael Waite, Superior String Alliance musicians, St. Paul's Choir, and other artists performed to a totally packed sanctuary - even the balcony was full! The event raised about \$7,000 toward our grant match (Wow! Thank you, Jan B!) but even more importantly many community members experienced some of the energy and love at St. Paul's.

Lake Superior Community Partnership helped us put out press releases about the grant and the concert to local media. St. Paul's and our grant efforts have received good coverage in the Mining Journal and on local TV stations.

We have received a \$15,000 matching grant from the M.E. Davenport Foundation, with special thanks to Mary Sullivan. We received an unsolicited \$500 grant from the Francis Farwell Fund (part of the Marquette Community Foundation). We also received generous contributions from the Frazier Fund and the Phyllis and Max Reynolds Foundation. We have several other grant applications pending with other foundations. With assistance from the Diocesan Office, we will seek more grants on the state and national level.

Fundraising brochures and pledge cards for the grant have been printed and have been distributed to the congregation. We will also be mailing them out to St. Paul's "alumni" and friends throughout the state and the country, as well as to supporters in the community.

We plan to submit our request for the first half of the NFSP grant funds on **May1**. We will be working with Northern Restoration to begin restoring our sandstone and to tuck-pointing the masonry on the sanctuary building and Morgan Chapel later this summer.

Popular local radio personality and amateur historian, Jim Koski, has agreed to host one of his popular 'History Walking Tours" this summer featuring St. Paul's, our history in the community, and the 150th anniversary of our sanctuary. We will keep you posted when a date has been confirmed.

## A letter from Steve Godfrey Concerning May and Indigenous Connections

Friends,

Happy Easter!

As a diocese, we are committed to building and deepening relationships with the Indigenous communities of the U.P. and supporting and amplifying their leadership in addressing the challenges that have resulted from colonial settlement that was encouraged by the church. A few opportunities are coming up in May for us all to participate in these efforts:

Sugarcane is an important new documentary film about the trauma individuals, families, and communities experience due to Indigenous/Native American residential/boarding schools. It will be shown in Marquette on Saturday, May 10 (1:00 p.m. at Marquette Cinemas), and in Sault Ste Marie on Monday, May 12 (5:30 p.m. at DreamMakers Theatre at Kewadin Casino). Please attend one of these showings if you can and spread the word among your congregations, families, and friends. Each showing will be free and followed by facilitated conversation to address the very challenging information presented. The topic is difficult and this film is rated R, so this is for adults and older youth with support of parents or guardians. Please register if you plan to attend the Marquette showing, to help us make sure we have enough space (no pre-registration is needed for the Sault Ste Marie showing). We are exploring possibilities for showings in other parts of the diocese in the months to come.

Red Dress Displays: The National Day of Awareness for Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women is May 5. Native women, girls and two-spirits endure human trafficking, abuse and murder at a higher rate than any other group in America. For the month of May, Congregations are encouraged to collect and display loaned red dresses throughout the pews, on coatracks, etc., and hang older donated red dresses outdoors surrounding church perimeters. Please invite church and community to donate and/or loan dresses. The diocesan office is also collecting donations and loans that may be available. Contact our Director of Reparations and Justice (leora@upepiscopal.org) or me for more information. A flyer is attached that you can copy to have available. Please let us know if you would like copies sent in the mail and/or if you would like a yard sign if you are displaying red dresses outdoors.

The Walking Together: Finding Common Ground Traveling Exhibit will be on display at the Ishpeming Public Library May 6-31. This exhibit was developed by the Diocese in partnership with the Great Lakes Peace Center to uncover, acknowledge, and document the truth about Indigenous experiences in the Michigan Native American boarding schools. ### **Important Notes:**

- 1. So far in 2025 we have withdrawn \$20,000 from the St. Paul's Trust for church operations, and anticipate further withdrawals in 2025. Prudent financial management indicates we should <a href="limit-our withdrawals">limit-our withdrawals</a> for operations.
- 2. Note, we are expecting an operating loss of -\$67,570 at St. Paul's in 2025.
- 3. Trust data is updated through 3/31/25. The next update will be 6/30/25. Year to date trust returns as of 3-31-25 are -3.86%
