Becoming Beloved Community

Becoming Beloved Community as defined by TEC: "As the Episcopal branch of the Jesus Movement, we dream and work to foster Beloved Communities where all people may experience dignity and abundant life and see themselves and others as beloved children of God. The Becoming Beloved Community Vision Document and accompanying resources help us to understand and take up the long-term commitments necessary to form loving, liberating and life-giving relationships with each other. Together, we are growing as reconcilers, justice-makers, and healers in the name of Christ".

The Becoming Beloved Community (BBC) Team of the Diocese of Northern Michigan was born in April of 2019 when members of the Diocese's Justice and Peace Committee attended a BBC gathering in the Diocese of Ohio. This gathering inspired many of the attendants to journey together in the important work of dismantling systemic racism in our church and communities. We learned at this Province V event that efforts are going on all around the church and the Province and we were eager to share the work in our Diocese and hear from other people. Members of the BBC team include Sarah Diener-Schlitt, Arlene Gordanier, Rick Stanitis, Leora Tadgerson, Bishop Rayford Ray and Kathy Vanden Boogaard.

In 2019, the Diocese of Northern Michigan was the recipient of an Impact grant to continue expanding our Becoming Beloved Community efforts. One of the goals for this grant was to offer a **Peace Camp** this past summer but due to unforeseen circumstances, it had to be postponed. It is now being planned for the weekend of August 21-23, 2026 at Fortune Lake Camp in Crystal Falls, MI. Planning team members include Marty Reinhart, Tina Moses, Leora Tadgerson, Sarah Diener-Schlitt, Megan Trimm, Katie Chipman-Bergsma, Charles Murphy and Bishop Rayford Ray.

The funds received from this Becoming Beloved Community Impact grant have also allowed us to continue our commitment to the work of racial healing, reconciliation, and justice in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan with Indigenous nations through the United Thank Offering grant that began in 2018 and included the completion of a **traveling exhibit entitled "Walking Together Finding Common Ground"** Phase one consisted of a stationary exhibit called *The 7th Fire which was* on display at the Beaumier Heritage Center (campus of NMU) from Oct. 2021-April 2022, and consisted of a timeline of the history of the Anishinaabe people as well interactive experiences that sought to define and place decolonization in the context of contemporary Anishinaabe life. Phase two consisted of converting these materials into the *Walking Together: Finding Common Ground Traveling Exhibit* along with survivor and descendent stories of Michigan based Indian boarding school experiences. The exhibit was completed last year and additional funding from the Davenport Family Foundation has helped our staff bring this truth telling initiative to thousands of hearts and minds! Since its unveiling in January of 2024, the exhibit has traveled approximately 4000 miles to various community and tribal locations.

We recently applied for another BBC grant to support moving the traveling exhibit into Phase three, which will focus on conducting additional interviews, and educational community engagement initiatives as well as developing a diocesan manual to guide staff and congregations into non-performative actionable policy recommendations meant to address the damaging legacy of the Indian boarding school system.

Project staff, including several Northern MI Episcopal Diocesan staff members have transported the exhibit to the following locations:

- February-March-April, 2025 at Christ Church Cathedral in Ohio
- May 2025 at the Ishpeming Carnegie Public Library
- June 26-30, 2025 at Provisional Coffee Shop in Marquette during Art Week
- July 25-27, 2025 at the Keweenaw Bay Indian Community (KBIC) Summer Pow
 Wow
- August 17, 2025 at St. Paul's Church in Marquette
- October 3-4, 2025 at the Diocesan Convention in South Dakota
- October 17-18 at the Northern Michigan Diocesan Convention in Escanaba
- End of October 2025 at Bay College in Escanaba

A second set of panels was printed on waterproof materials so that the exhibit could be on display from **June 28-August 23, 2025 at the Emberlight Festival in Ironwood, Michigan.** The exhibit was set up in Miners Memorial Heritage Park on land that once belonged to the Ojibwe Anishinaabe people. An open ceremony was held on June 28. Tom Biron, a Native elder, who contributed to the exhibit, led a discussion which included his experience attending an Indian boarding school.

After the festival ended, this exhibit was moved to the **Ironwood Historical Society Museum** and will be on display there through the end of October 2025.

Videographer, Mitch Bolo, and graphic designer, Ariel Gougeon, are both enrolled members of the Keweenaw Bay Indian Community. Mitch filmed, edited and produced each of the nine survivor and descendant videos as well as Bishop Ray's apology that are now up on our live website. Ariel developed the official project logo, graphics, layout, and created an entirely new font dedicated specifically and exclusively to the exhibit materials, all of which can be found on our live website: "Walking Together - Finding Common Ground." Mitch has also recently created a YouTube channel for the traveling exhibit and all of the videos can also be found there at this link: https://www.youtube.com/@WalkingTogetherMQT

2024-2025 At a Glance

- Rice Program Launched With support from Bishop Rayford Ray, 20 international students and their families are receiving rice every month each semester, meeting the most requested pantry need.
- Wednesday Night Meals 45–60 students fed weekly; Odyssey Grant covers meals for the entire academic year.
- Food Pantry Expansion Transitioned to in-person pick-up and continued to serve increasing numbers of students as grocery prices rose, supported by a number of local funders
- ESL Program Growth Awarded an ESL grant to expand "Let's Talk," supporting
 international students and families with new hardware, software, and materials.
- Sustainability & Safety
 - M. E. Davenport Foundation partnership created a Development Associate role to grow program funding, increase visibility and build long-term stability.
 - Superior Health Foundation AED award increased safety for students, their families, volunteers and guests.

Justice and Peace Committee

Justice and Peace marks our way here in the Diocese of Northern Michigan. We have made an impact with various opportunities of revealing "love" and "healing" in the midst of daily living. Opportunities included:

- The Showing of Sugarcane in Marquette and in Sault Ste Marie. These showings were held in theaters and in local congregations in the diocese and the public was invited to attend with conversation following the showing.
- Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women was marked with the hanging of dresses inside and outside of congregations in the diocese.
- Our participation and participation in showing of the Traveling Exhibit (the story of Colonization, Boarding Schools stories as well as Decolonizing) throughout the Upper Peninsula from Provisions in Marquette, to the Library in Ishpeming, to KBIC in Baraga as well as Marquette's gathering of the Sault Tribe/KBIC Pow Wow at the Dome in Marquette, LVD tribal nation in the Western End of the Upper Peninsula to the Outdoor Art's Festival in Ironwood for the Summer months to Bay College Campus in Escanaba. It has made a journey here in the U.P. as well downstate at Mt. Pleasant and beyond.
- Members of our diocese have also participated in walks here in the U.P. remembering the survivors (living and dead) of boarding schools
- We have joined in Covenant with Equality Michigan in support of efforts in coordinating much needed support for LGBTQ+ youth. We now participate regularly in monthly working groups for the much-needed work supporting our LGBQT+ siblings throughout the Upper Peninsula.
- We have participated in Pride festivities in Escanaba, Ironwood, Marquette, the Keweenaw (Houghton/Calumet), the Straits of Mackinaw, and in the Soo.
- Our diocese continues the work of providing Soul Shop (Suicide Prevention workshops) throughout the diocese.
- Our Becoming Beloved Community meets monthly as we redefine and work on our workshops around Dismantling the Doctrine of Discovery.
- We have also focused on the food insecurity here in the U.P. with support of food banks in various communities, Colleges and Universities, as well as Feeding America West, and the Lunch Box in Crystal Falls.

- Our participation in Michigan Interfaith Power and Light, a statewide organization focused on sustainability, renewable energy, and advocacy work around Line 5 and the Tunnel.
- Our participation locally by our faith communities has also made a difference in the life of our local communities.

I want to thank you for making an impact on the lives of our local communities. It is all about healing this world and the heart being the center of our lives.

Province V Executive Board report to the Diocese of Northern Michigan 2024-2025

Province V is a network of 11 dioceses of the Episcopal Church. Our diocese is one of those 11 [Title 1, Canon 9: Of Provinces]. I have been appointed as the diocesan representative on the Province V Executive Board, and with this report I'll share resources available and events occurring at the provincial level. Please review this report and share information with others in your worshipping community!

The Theme of Province V: CONNECT, SUPPORT, COLLABORATE

In Province V, we "tell it in the light" (Matthew 10:27-31), celebrating God's promise of renewal within the Episcopal Church in the Midwest.

To do this, we:

Connect people to people and people to resources.

Support each other in a variety of ministries, resourcing from within and without. **Collaborate** across multiple dioceses to build capacity for demonstrable impact.

Leadership

The Province V Executive Board is responsible for the operations of the province. There are 17 members of this board, which includes the 11 diocesan representatives, 2 members (one lay and one clergy) who serve on the Executive Council of the Episcopal Church, and 4 elected officers. Board members meet monthly via Zoom to share resources from our dioceses and hear about and help develop provincial events and programming. The board gathers in-person once per year to build deeper connections and have in-depth conversation about vision and strategic planning for the province.

Most Recent Grants Received by Province V

These grants were received in 2024 for Special Projects and New Programs, and the funds are currently in use in the following ways:

• United Thank Offering Grant, \$55,000

This grant launched Province V's new *Engaging Gender Complexity* (*EGC*) initiative. *EGC* will help individuals and worshiping communities create welcoming space for *all* people and will equip participants to welcome gender-diverse individuals into their community without causing harm to or undue emotional and psychological labor for them. Province V worked with S. Bear Bergman to provide training to facilitators and coaches. Their work in their local ministry contexts begins Fall 2025.

Constable Fund Grant, \$30,000

Province V received funds to create a curriculum in response to Resolution D-030 [GC80]. Bexley Seabury is the vendor for creating this curriculum, which will then be available to the whole church through their Pathways for Baptismal Living platform. The curriculum is coming together and receiving feedback for updating and editing. There will be a pilot program in September with the Diocese of Iowa. Based on feedback from that pilot, the curriculum will be edited and made ready for churchwide use. We plan to have a full report by the end of 2025.

Becoming Beloved Community Impact Grant, \$10,200

Through this grant, Total Life Wellness will present a total of nine (9) trainings by the end of 2025.

Description for this online course: Join this online course to learn how to recognize human trafficking and support those reentering our community after human exploitation. This 90-minute course will introduce participants to the basics of trafficking, how to respond when trafficking is suspected, and how their community can help those on their journey from surviving to thriving.

Church Periodical Club (CPC), \$756

The Province IV / V Creation Care Event was a great success, and this grant provided books to each participant. The Provinces are grateful for the CPC's support as we continue to share ways of caring for all of creation. Visit https://revivingcreation.org to explore Margaret's work.

• Trinity Church's Leadership Development Grant, \$375,000

This grant provided the funds to hire Mr. Eric Richey as the Campus Ministry Developer. He started on January 1 and has been working to connect with many across the province and across the church. There will be a "Campus Ministry Cohort: Engaging with Institutions of Higher Learning" beginning Fall 2025, and another launching Spring 2026. Congregational Leaders (lay and ordained) will learn how to engage Institutions of Higher Learning (IHL) in their local ministry context. IHLs include community colleges, trade schools, professional schools, colleges and universities.

Sacred Space Campus Ministry

The 2024-2025 academic year saw the third year of an interdenominational partnership for campus ministry at Northern Michigan University. Hosted and housed by Marquette Hope, the ministry consists of a coffee shop/study space, a Sunday night dinner, Thursday afternoon programming, theology on tap conversations, and pop up hikes/adventures in nature. Three denominations participate in Sacred Space Campus Ministry: the Methodist church, the Lutheran church, and the Episcopal church.

Having received a grant from The Episcopal Church to support an intern and to pay for cooking supplies, we had a lot of fun focusing our ministry through the lens of teaching college students to cook. Besides continual practice by preparing meals for Sunday night dinner, we hosted two events in the Spring semester: "Rice and Spice Tasting", and "Can You Scone It?". Partnering with the Wellbeing initiative on campus the "Rice and Spice Tasting" event centered around bowls of white rice and twenty different herbs, spices, and spice mixes. Sprinkling the herbs and spices on the rice, robust conversations were had concerning culinary possibilities. The "Can You Scone It?" event was a cooking show knock off where students created imaginative permutations of scones that were judged by a panel of community and student judges, including our very own Charles Murphy. A great time was had by all, especially the winner who had created what was judged as "the perfect camping scone" flavored by sharp cheddar cheese and hot dogs.

SoulShop Suicide Prevention

This past year, SoulShop was invited into three spaces for suicide prevention. The first was a half-day confirmation retreat with the Lutheran Churches in Marquette County where we spent the morning in conversation with youth, their pastors, friends and parents, talking about desperation, contributors to suicide, and helpers who can be protective agents in our lives. It was a robust and busy morning for two dozen middle-schoolers and their parents. It was a delight to co-present with J. Mills from the Synod and we look forward to doing more work together.

In addition to this morning workshop, two full day workshops were held in the Spring: one hosted by St. Stephen's in Escanaba and the other by Trinity Church in Houghton. These workshops were sponsored by community partners and supplemented with materials purchased with funds from the Wylie Fund. In Escanaba, a meaningful and fruitful relationship has begun with the local suicide prevention task force/alliance because of the workshop. In fact, that group did much recruitment for the event which is suicide prevention work itself. In Houghton, Copper Shores paid for the expenses of the workshop and worked diligently to get people in the room. The best feedback we received at the Houghton workshop was from two young adults who said that they both "had been waiting for and looking for" a conversation like this for a long time.

2024 Year End Summary

Investment performance for 2024 was again very strong, with total returns after fees of 19.04%. This rate of return is based on a weighted average calculation which takes into consideration the timing of all deposits, transfers and withdrawals. This return compares with a benchmark return of 20.09%, which is made up of 85% S&P 500 and 15% Barclay's U.S. Aggregate Bond Index. The S&P 500 Index itself was up 23.31% for the year.

All stock and bond segments of the portfolio ended the year with positive returns. The most significant gains were again seen in the mega-cap growth segment. Mid-cap and Small-cap stocks also showed double-digit returns for the year. With inflation down in most areas, the Fed cut interest rates, first by 0.50% in September and then by 0.25% in November and December.

Total assets under management at year-end were \$23,475,947. The Trust Association continues to use a "growth oriented" asset allocation model, with a target of having 85% equities and 15% fixed income and cash. Fund diversification is accomplished using a variety of broadly based, low-cost exchange traded funds (ETF's) which include large-cap stocks, mid-cap stocks and small-cap stocks as well as U.S. Treasury and corporate bonds.

It is worth noting that over the past 10 years, the Trust Association has experienced an average annual rate of growth in assets under management of 8.13%. This return came about despite taking out over \$10.3 million in diocesan and congregational distributions.


June 30, 2025 Interim Results

2025 to date has been a rather up and down year as political and economic issues have taken center stage in creating what has been a rather volatile market. Year-to-date as of June 30, 2025, the investment portfolio was up 3.94% net of fees. The market continues to deal with issues related to inflation, employment and tariffs. So far, the Federal Reserve Board has left interest rates unchanged.
